Celebration of International Day for Vulture Awareness (IVAD) 2021

International Day for Vulture Awareness (IVAD) 04 Sept. 2021

Vultures are most important scavenger and play an important role in clearing animal carcasses and municipal dumps. Vultures are large birds' carrion eaters. By consuming the carcasses of diseased animals, vultures prevent



the spread of life-threatening diseases such as rabies and anthrax among animals and humans.

There are 22 kinds of vultures which includes 15 types of Old World vultures and 7 types of New World vultures. Due to a lot of variations in geographical and environmental gradient 9 species are reported to be present in India (Ali and Ripley, 1987):King vulture (*Sarcogyps calvus*), Cinereous vulture (*Aegypius monachus*), Griffon vulture (*Gyps fulvus*), Himalayan Griffon vulture (*Gyps himalayensis*), Long-billed vulture (*Gyps indicus*), Slender-billed vulture (*Gyps tenuirostris*), White-backed vulture (*Gyps bengalensis*), Egyptian vulture (*Neophron percnopterus*), Bearded vulture (*Gypaetus barbatus*) (Ali *et al.*, 1995).

Vultures are known to colonize wooded as well as open habitats with agriculture and tree cover (Robinson 1994; Donazar *et al.* 2002a,b). On the basis of forest and vegetation cover, Uttar Pradesh (UP) has been divided into three major eco-zones: The Tarai (moist deciduous forests), the Gangetic plains (agriculture landscape) and the Bundelkhand (dry deciduous forests) including Vindhyan regions (Islam & Rahmani 2004). **There are 8 species of vultures in Uttar Pradesh.**


The International Vulture Awareness Day is celebrated each year on the first Saturday of September. The aim is to carry out the conservational activities by the different institution participating in it from different countries.
